There are **5** THEORIES regarding relationship between International Law & Municipal Law.

THEORY 1 : MONISM THEORY

Law is a <u>unified field of knowledge</u> i.e., International law & Municipal law are of *same phenomenon*.

It is applicable to *Individuals & States*.

THEORY 2 : DUALIST THEORY

International Law & Muncipal law *are different*.

<u>Individual</u> is subject of Muncipal law, Whereas <u>State</u> is subject of International law. Supported by Wright Kelsen Duguit.

THEORY 3 : SPECIFIC ADOPTION THEORY

If you want to apply international law in your state(eg : India), it has to be specifically adopted, for it to be enforced.


<u>Example</u>: Hague Hijacking Convention 1970, was specifically enforced by <u>Anti-Hijacking Act, 2016</u>.
